PROFILES OF SCHOLARS IN THE DIASPORA



Dr. Sayed Mahdi Mosawi

Sayed Mahdi Mosawi is a Research Fellow at the Alwaleed Centre for the Study of Islam in the Contemporary World at the University of Edinburgh, UK. Holding a PhD in Sociology from Hacettepe Universi-

ty, Turkey, he specialises in gender studies, masculinities, migration, transnationalism, refugees, and the Muslim diaspora. Through extensive fieldwork in Afghanistan, Iran, Germany, and the UK, Dr. Mosawi offers profound insights into the complexities of masculinities and forced migration. He has contributed to several scholarly publications, most recently a research article in Religions titled "Everyday Lived Islam among Hazara Migrants in Scotland: Intersectionality, Agency, and Individualisation" (2024). He also authored a book chapter on honour, masculinity, and violence in Afghanistan (Routledge, 2020) and co-authored The Other Side of Gender Inequality: Men and Masculinities in Afghanistan, published in English, Dari, and Pashto. As a dedicated educator, Dr. Mosawi has designed and delivered several courses, including "Unfolding Afghanistan in a Globalised Context" at the University of Edinburgh, for which he was nominated for the Teaching Awards 2024.



Dr. Naim Asas

Dr. Naim Asas serves as the Director of the Groupement d'Études et de Réflexions Internationales en Sciences Sociales (GERISS), where he oversees research initiatives and intellectual dialogues on

critical social science issues. A distinguished researcher and international speaker, Dr. Asas has authored four notable books on Afghanistan: La Représentation Afghane, Les Enjeux Stratégiques de l'Afghanistan, Neuf Fois Rescapé de la Mort, and L'Odyssée Afghane: Entre les Histoires Conflictuelles et Espoirs de Paix. These works offer deep insights into Afghanistan's complex socio-political landscape, historical conflicts, and aspirations for peace.

In addition to his focus on Afghanistan, Dr. Asas's research spans Azerbaijan, Armenia, and neighbouring countries, addressing broader geopolitical and international relations issues. His academic contributions, including numerous articles, reflect his commitment to exploring regional dynamics, strategic challenges, and pathways toward stability.



Dr. Masooma Torfa

Masooma Torfa is a consultant and a co-founding member of Female Fellows, currently based in Germany. Masooma has a PhD degree in refugee

migration and labour market integration of refugees in Germany, from the University of Hohenheim in Stuttgart, Germany.

Dr. Torfa has a master's degree in economics, a diploma in development management from Germany, and a bachelor's degree in economics from Kabul University in Afghanistan. Dr. Torfa has professional work experience in development projects with the United Nations Kabul Office and USAID in Afghanistan. Related to international migration, she has worked on policy advocacy, labour market integration and empowerment of migrant women with numerous institutions including the European Commission, the European Council on Refugees and Exiles (ECRE), the European Programme for Integration and Migration (EPIM), Advocate Europe, Maltese, AGDW, and Female Fellows. Masoom's recent publications focused on private companies' engagement in the labour market integration of refugees in Germany. She has also written on Afghan and Syrian refugees' integration opportunities and challenges as well as the role of influential actors/factors in migration and integration processes.


