Businesses ravaged by the Covid pandemic found new hope in the opening of the Khorog Centre for Entrepreneurship (KCE) on August 17. Established by the University of Central Asia's (UCA) School

of Professional and Continuing Education (SPCE), the Centre aims at providing advice, training, and support to generate income and promote market development for small business leaders and farmers

in the region. It is part of Tajikistan's Local Economic Development in Selected High-Mountain Regions Project, which aims to strengthen the competitiveness of various enterprises.

Why does a university such as UCA promote entrepreneurship? The Rector of UCA, Prof. Dr. S. Sohail H. Naqvi, responded in his welcome address:

"The answer is simple but also complicated...It is simple because UCA is an integral part of the Aga Khan Development Network, whose simple and clear objective is improving the quality of life of people. It is complicated because an educational institution is about knowledge...but if we want to improve the quality of life of people, this knowledge has to find a pathway and means to support and celebrate human endeavour through entrepreneurship."

The pandemic has significantly impacted global economic conditions, and the month-

ly earnings of individual entrepreneurs have declined by 54% in the GBAO region of Tajikistan. To help people emerge from this challenging situation, KCE will introduce new and innovative ways to build and support highly competitive businesses, regional brands, and business linkages by bringing together startups, business consultants, and investors from the region and around the world.

Mrs. Sabine Olthof, Country Director, The Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusamdmenarbeit (GIZ) GmbH said during her remarks at the ceremony, "One idea that I personally like very much is the establishment of a Credit Union of Alumni under the Centre for Entrepreneurship to support new emerging and

existing businesses." The Khorog Centre for Entrepreneurship has been established with generous support from GIZ, in cooperation with the Aga Khan Foundation, Tajikistan.

Among the many distinguished guests at the opening ceremony was Anvar Imatshozoda, Deputy Governor of GBAO who extended his gratitude to the Tajik Government and UCA for their ongoing efforts to promote the development of young people, "The result is that today the graduates of the University are engaged not only in the country but also abroad in the largest scientific and cultural centers of the world."

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UCA Welcomes Class of 2026

Every year, the incoming cohort arrives on the campus a week before the commencement of classes to help them adapt to the new environment and socialize. UCA welcomed 70 students from Central Asia, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Russia and Syria in the Class of 2026. Over 70% of the incoming class come from Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Kazakhstan.

Summer Institute Organises Social-Emotional Workshop

UCA successfully concluded the Social-Emotional Workshop organised for its students, faculty, and staff to help them effectively communicate, maintain their mental health, and perform conflict analysis to boost social-emotional intelligence during these unprecedented times.

"When employees are healthy and they enjoy coming to work, everything improves including productivity and teamwork," says Robin Higgins, University Counsellor at UCA.

The workshop was based on three modules: Communicating Effectively in a Pluralistic World, Conflict Analysis and Transformation, and Workplace Mental Health and Wellbeing. The sessions were facilitated by Mary-Ann Morris, Nursing Professor and Health Educator; Randy Janzen, Conflict Transformation Instructor, and Jonny Morris, CEO of Canadian Mental Health, along with UCA's faculty and staff.

One of the participants, Natalia Stavitskaia, Finance Manager at UCA, shared her experience from the workshop: "Since I joined UCA, my first Summer Institute [mental health workshop] was in 2018. I found that for myself my mental health at work is almost as important as my professional knowledge...Being mentally healthy allows me to help others - to see if there are any issues with my team, or any problems faced by my colleagues, and offer help – personal or professional. I am using techniques I have learned with workshop organisers, counselors and groupmates to improve my ability to listen to myself and others, including my family and friends."

International Office Awards Twelve Scholarships in Two Years

The University of Central Asia's International Office has awarded twelve scholarships for the academic years 2020-22 to deserving candidates across Central Asia, Pakistan and Afghanistan to pursue their academic careers internationally.

"Without the establishment of the International Office and the many strong and quality partnerships it has established in a relatively short time with the best universities in the world, all of this would remain a pipedream for me and many

others," says Makhfirat Olimshoeva, Interdisciplinary PhD student at the Simon Fraser University (SFU) in Canada.

Olimshoeva hails from Khorog, Tajikistan, and has been awarded a full scholarship to pursue postgraduate studies as part of the Central Asian Faculty Development Programme (CAFDP) at UCA. She has been serving as a faculty at the School of Arts and Sciences (SAS) before joining SFU and is expected to return to UCA upon completion of her studies to either teach or conduct research. The programme is designed to ensure that scholars from the region are strongly represented in UCA's faculty.

CAFDP has awarded 62 scholarships since 2008. Along with Olimshoeva are two more faculty members from SAS currently pursuing their PhDs at SFU – Shams Sharif and Maqsad Suriev.

AKHP Staff Present Papers at the International Summer School

The Aga Khan Humanities Project (AKHP) staff shared their pedagogical and methodological experiences at the International Summer School organised by the International Center for the Rapprochement of Cultures under the auspices of UNESCO in August 2021.

Dr Pulat Shozimov, Acting Head and

Faculty Development Programme (FDP) Manager; Dr Nurzhauar Issayeva, FDP Coordinator for Kazakhstan; Marifat Alifbekova, Humanities Fellow, and Obidkhon Kurbonkhonov, Project Coordinator from AKHP were invited to present papers. Among the topics were Method of Cross-Disciplinary Discourse in Pedagogy as a Way of Conceptual Rapprochement

of Diverse Cultures, and Methods of Interpretations Through the Perspective of the Connection between Context, Concept and Content. Dr Issayeva was also involved as one of the organisers and moderators of the event.

"The main success of AKHP presentations at the Summer International School was related to the interconnection between theory/innovations and practice via pedagogy, sciences and social activities through AKHP debates around key fundamental issues that come from the Central Asian context," said Dr Pulat Shozimov.

The Summer School invited over 100 teachers and administrators from Central Asia, Russia and Azerbaijan to share innovative methods for improving education. There were 16 presenters at the event, of which 50% were affiliated with AKHP. The event focused on providing a platform to create dialogue and develop competencies among teachers of the region. AKHP staff shared pedagogical case studies from courses taught under the Humanities in English project.

AKHP Debate Club Celebrates 9th Anniversary

The Aga Khan Humanities Project celebrated the 9th anniversary of its Debate Club by organising a Republic Debate Tournament in August 2021. The tournament gathered 40 best debaters and top 10 adjudicators from across Tajikistan to discuss various economic, political, and social issues.



Anusha Ashurova, a student at UCA's School of Arts and Sciences attended the tournament as one of the participants and com-

mented: "It gave me a great opportunity to improve my critical thinking skills. I got a chance to meet incredible personalities, share experiences and improve my public speaking skills. I also exchanged ideas about important issues with open-minded people."

AKHP debates are considered among the prestigious tournaments across the

country. It is the first club in Tajikistan to organize debate competitions in the English language. The club coordinators have also played a key role in implementing the

widely recognized Cross-Debate Format in the country, and successfully organised local, regional, and international debating activities.

Second Cycle of the Executive Entrepreneurship Training Starts

UCA's School of Professional and Continuing Education successfully concluded a Training of Trainers (ToT) in Naryn and Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan. The month-long training was attended by 13 local business trainers, who polished their existing skills and gained new ones by designing an Entrepreneurship and Incubation programme from scratch.

A leading business advisor, Faisal Sherijan, conducted the training within the framework of an ongoing project - Local Impact: A Transformative Partnership in Asia and Africa. As part of the training, participants met various entrepreneurs, government representatives, and NGO workers to initiate open dialogues and were inspired to become entrepreneurial thinkers and business creators.

The programme was delivered in two parts: training, and module development. The training was delivered at the SPCE Centre in Naryn, where participants enjoyed the scenic beauty of the town

while acquiring new skills. During the module development, the cohort visited Bishkek to start work on the development of their individual training modules which included curricula, concept notes, and learning materials. The trainers will now interact with a broader audience in September, including marginalized youth. The Local Impact project is funded by USAID and the Aga Khan Foundation.
