Youth Voice for Climate Justice **Conference in Kabul**

The "Youth Voice for Climate Justice: A Dialogue for Afghanistan's Future" conference was held at Kabul University on January 22, 2025, with 200 participants. The conference discussed sustainable solutions and amplified the voices of communities most affected by climate change, emphasizing the role of young leaders in these initiatives. The event was organized by the Samsoor Watan Environmental Organization and the Faculty of Environmental Sciences at Kabul University, with support from the University of Central Asia.



The conference participants included youth leaders, activists, environmental experts, and representatives from government agencies and non-governmental organizations. The keynote address, delivered by Professor M. Dawood Shirzad on "Silencing Is the Real Crime," stressed the importance of including youth and indigenous elders in climate discussions, which advances intergenerational responsibility in climate advoca-

cy. Breakout group discussions focused on elaborating various issues and formulating policy recommendations.

The event was initiated by Dr. Mujib Rahman Ahmadzai, a doctoral grant recipient, staff member of the Faculty of Environmental Sciences, and Senior Advisor of the Samsoor Watan Environmental Organization.

PROFILES OF SCHOLARS IN THE DIASPORA



Dr. Jalal Naser Faqiryar

Dr. Jalal Naser Faqiryar is a scholar, civil engineer, and water resources specialist. He has an MEng in Water Engineering and Management from the Asian Institute of Technology in Thailand and a

triple master's degree from Oregon State University, the University for Peace, and IHE-Delft. He began his career with the Western Basins Water Resources Management Project in western Afghanistan, where he contributed significantly to the planning and oversight of hydraulic structures, hydrological analysis, and quality control of water infrastructure projects. Later, he served in key roles at the Ministry of Agriculture, Irrigation, and Livestock, undertaking projects that involved designing and reviewing irrigation, and natural resource project work plans (including Qush Tepa National Irrigation Canal) and providing strategic advice to the Deputy Minister for Irrigation and Natural Resources. Dr. Faqiryar was appointed Director General of the Kabul River Basin. He later served as Head of the Palaces and Kabul River Project at the National Development Corporation under the Office of the President of Afghanistan. Currently, he is conducting research for IHE-Delft on water issues in Central Asia and Afghanistan.

ARI PUBLIC LECTURES

4 November 2024 Economic Management, Aid Dependency and State Failure in Afghanistan

Speaker: Dr. Kambaiz Rafi, Political Economist, UK. *Discussant:* Dr. Lutfi Rahimi, ARI Non-Resident Research Fellow.

This lecture draws on recently completed research to explore a contradiction within the liberal approach to state-building. In postwar liberal state-building efforts, a market economy is often expected to generate sufficient revenue through private sector taxes. However, these tax revenues typically fall short, and tax institutions are frequently overlooked in reconstruction. Consequently, states become heavily reliant on foreign aid managed by external agencies, ultimately undermining the development of the state's bureaucracy. The lecture introduces the concept of a "deferred revenue regime," arguing that this reliance on ODA (Official Development Assistance) encapsulates the inherent contradictions of the state-building model. Dr. Ahmad Farid Asadullahi

Ahmad Farid Asadullahi was born in Jaghori District, Ghazni Province. He studied Farsi-Dari Language and Literature at Kabul University and completed his master's degree in Farsi-Dari literature

at the State Teachers Training University of Tajikistan. His doctoral dissertation was "The Resistance Poetry in Farsi-Dari of Afghanistan".

Dr. Asadullahi has taught Farsi-Dari literature at Ghazni University and in the Department of Farsi-Dari at Kabul University. To date, he has published a book in Russian titled *The Resistance Poetry in Farsi-Dari* and several academic articles on contemporary Farsi-Dari poetry in scientific journals of Tajikistan. Over the past two decades, alongside his university teaching, he has actively worked on institutionalizing the values of democracy and human rights within civil society organizations.

Dr. Asadullahi is currently an Assistant Professor of Farsi-Dari Language and Literature at Haverford College in Pennsylvania. Additionally, he teaches Farsi-Dari as a Visiting Assistant Professor at Bryn Mawr College.

28 November 2024 Preserving the Old City of Herat and its Surroundings

Speaker: Dr. Gulam Mohammad Asim, ARI Non-Resident Research Fellow, Postdoctoral Researcher, University of the Ryukus, Okinawa, Japan. Discussant: Ajmal Maiwandi, Chief Executive Officer, the Aga Khan Cultural Services, Afghanistan.

Herat, the regional capital of Western Afghanistan, is an ancient city with a large historic architectural ensemble which is on the Tentative List of World Heritage sites with UNESCO. The lecture reviews the preservation activities of the Aga Khan Trust for Culture from 2005 to 2011. It presents current research that involved multiple surveys of the city's experts, stakeholders, and selected residents to propose an approach to preserving and restoring the historic landscape of Herat. Protecting the city's architectural heritage as an asset for future generations requires sound policies based on research and a balanced approach. Watch the full lecture here.

Food Security and Transborder Water Governance: Case Study of the Qush Tepa Irrigation Canal, Afghanistan

Speaker: Jalal Naser Fagiryar, Delft Institute for Water Education, the Netherlands. Discussant: Dr. Arnaud Caiserman, Senior Research Fellow, Mountain Societies Research Institute, University of Central Asia, Tajikistan.

Built in northern Afghanistan by diverting water from the Amu Darya, the Qush Tepa Irrigation Canal is converting approximately 550,000 hectares of desert into

farmland, significantly contributing to addressing the country's urgent food security issues. Initially conceived by Daud Khan's government in 1973, the canal remained unrealized until the Taliban came to power, at which point it became a priority project starting in 2022. Because the canal will reduce the annual water supply to downstream countries by approximately 6.5 billion cubic meters, it has raised significant concerns among countries such as Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan. This lecture examines the canal's potential impact on increasing agricultural productivity, the management challenges associated with the canal, and the possibilities for regional cooperation. 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I Try Not to Think of Afghanistan: Lithuanian Veterans of the Soviet War


