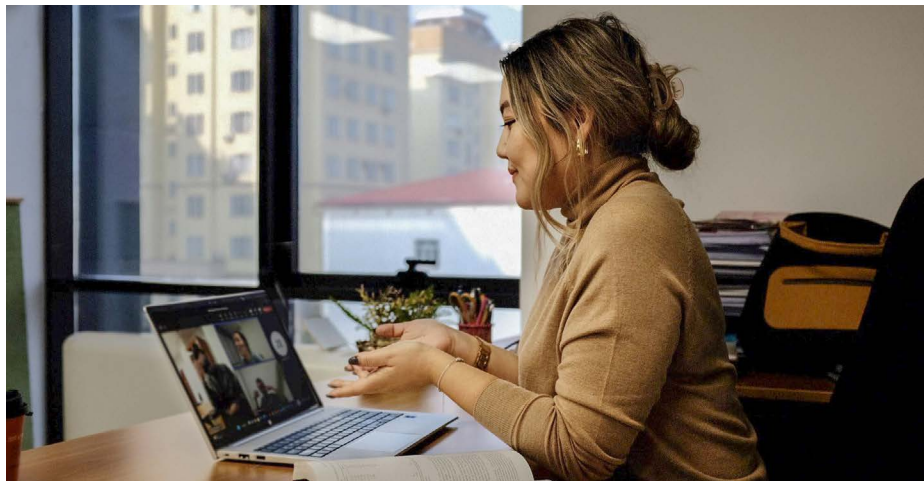
She also has the ability to embrace challenges and to step up to her responsibilities without hesitation – even in areas that are completely new to her.”

Empowering Afghan Students for Graduate Studies

The Afghanistan Research Initiative (ARI), implemented by UCA’s Graduate School of Development launched an innovative programme to prepare Afghan learners for their journey into graduate studies through a series of comprehensive online preparatory courses.

Over the period from August 2022 to May 2023, ARI delivered the “English for Academic Purposes” course, meticulously designed to equip two cohorts of Afghan students, comprising 42 individuals including 20 female students, with essential skills essential for excelling in graduate-level studies.

Building on the momentum, ARI has intro-

duced its second online preparatory course, titled “Statistical Reasoning & Data Analysis.” This course, led by Dr. Marzhan Aikimbaeva, an economist and research fellow at the Graduate School’s Institute of Public Policy and Administration, provides students with a deep understanding of statistical methods and the application of probability in data analysis. ARI aims to help sustain the research and capacity gains made over the last decade and continue producing knowledge critical to Afghanistan’s present and future.

ARI is supported by Canada’s International Development Research Centre and the Aga Khan Foundation, Canada.

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Addressing the audience, Mr Mirzoqandov stated, “It should be noted that the University of Central Asia has been steadily advancing its cooperation with the various structures of the Government of Tajikistan, local authorities of the region and its cities and districts, universities, institutes and organizations.”

In his remarks, Governor Ergeshov mentioned, “I would like to emphasise that with the opening of the University of Central Asia in Naryn City, an international center of education and culture has emerged...UCA, as a social partner, has already successfully implemented a series of investment projects aimed at the development of the Naryn city and the Naryn region.”

Dr Shamsh Kassim-Lakha, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of UCA, sent a video message during the Ceremony reminding

students, “Recall that UCA has a significant position in the communities where our campuses are located. You will be seen by them as the face of UCA – as Ambassadors of UCA. We therefore expect you to become valuable members and contributors to the communities of Khorog and Naryn; and not just to life on your campus.”

Highlighting UCA’s commitment to quality education, Dr Maxim Khomyakov, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, said, “Learning today is not something confined to the schools; the very life of the human being is nowadays co-extensive with learning. Today, learning has become a life-long practice, and the universities cannot anymore claim monopoly for it. That is why the best universities today aim at providing skills for future learning. They make the graduates capable of independent studies... The University of Central Asia is such a

university.” The Associate Deans, Dr Soheil Ashrafi and Dr Kholiknazar Kuchakshoev, also joined the celebrations.

Greeting the incoming class, Dr Christopher Gerry, Dean of UCA’s Graduate School of Development, said, “Now, in being part of UCA, you are also part of a unique idea and the realisation of a distinctive vision. A vision for a multi-campus, multi-country university located in and focused upon the development and quality of life of the mountain societies, economies and communities of Central Asia.”

During the Ceremony, the Class of 2028 presented to UCA faculty a Legacy Book containing the signatures of all cohorts that came before them. In addition, they sealed heartfelt letters to their future selves in a Time Capsule, to be opened upon their graduation.

UCA Trains Kyrgyz Civil Servants on Cybersecurity and Internet of Things

UCA's Institute of Public Policy and Administration Graduate School of Development recently organised an Information Technology (IT) forum to equip Kyrgyz civil servants with essential IT subjects such as cybercrime prevention, the potential of Kyrgyzstan's digital economy and practical applications of the "Internet of Things". The forum featured a series of expert presentations and included officials from the Kyrgyz Republic's Ministry of Digital Development along with representatives from various ministries and school directors. Indira Sharshenova, Dep-

uty Minister of Digital Development of the Kyrgyz Republic, emphasised the importance of safeguarding personal data in the digital space. She stated, "The protection of this data is the protection of our citizens and the security of the state."

Under the project "Digital CASA - Kyrgyz Republic" UCA has successfully trained over 800 civil servants, with women constituting more than 50% of the participants. These training sessions have been conducted in Osh, Chui, and Naryn provinces.

UCA-Oxford Social Science Research Summer School

UCA's Graduate School of Development and the University of Oxford jointly organised a Social Science Research Summer School in August 2023. This intensive learning program brought together talented UCA researchers and civil society organisations to enhance their research skills and foster international collaboration in the field of social science.

"We are thrilled to welcome distinguished faculty and researchers hailing from prestigious institutions like Oxford University, Cambridge, UBC, and Meiji University. Their presence aims to enhance our research prowess, enabling us to amplify our influence and engagement on a global scale," – says Dr Kemel Toktomushev, Senior Research Fellow at UCA's Institute of Public Policy and Administration.

The success of the Summer School was a testament to the strong partnership between UCA and the University of Oxford. The programme provided a platform for aspiring researchers to engage with international experts, expand their knowledge, and build lasting connections.

Dr. Ariell Ahearn, a Departmental Lecturer at the School of Geography and the Environment, University of Oxford, mentioned how the "Post-pandemic societies in Inner Asia project" aimed to strengthen research capacities among UCA researchers and civil society groups and aimed to help them to develop the ability to publish in English, contribute to academic debates, and lead their own research grants.

Dr. Troy Sternberg, a Senior Researcher at the School of Geography and the Environment, University of Oxford, shared with summer school participants his passion for studying the environment and landscapes of the Central Asia region. He anticipated collaborating with UCA researchers to publish a book centered on Kyrgyzstan, acknowledging the importance of having local voices contribute to a deeper understanding of the country.

Julian Dierkes, Coordinator of the Program on Inner Asia at the University of British Columbia, Canada expressed his delight in supporting aspiring researchers and their ambitions. With a focus on Mongolia and a keen interest in Central Asia, Dierkes viewed the collaboration with UCA as an opportunity for mutual learning.

Professor Yuki Morinaga of Meiji University, Japan a climatologist, presented a case study on Minamata disease in Japan, which was the result of serious pollution: "During the rapid economic growth, in a hurry to catch up with Western countries we did make many mistakes, so we can share what lessons can be learned from Minamata disease for areas where pollution problems are still serious."

Post-Pandemic Societies in Inner Asia (PPIA) research project is a collaboration between the University of Oxford, United Kingdom, Kagoshima University, Japan, UCA's Institute of Public Policy and Administration, and the National University of Mongolia.

AKHP Trains Educators from the Region in Humanities

The Aga Khan Humanities Project (AKHP), a unit of UCA's Graduate School of Development recently concluded a Refresher Training, on content knowledge and pedagogical skills, for 43 university teaching staff representing 22 academic institutions from Tajikistan, Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan, and Uzbekistan. The participants will serve as intellectual resource support to their respective universities.

The trainings aimed to help participants in comprehending, articulating, and effectively communicating the fundamental principles of the AKHP anthologies, including the new edition of the "Introduction to Humanities", now translated in Tajik, Kazakh, and Kyrgyz. Participants explored the underlying intellectual perspectives, philosophy, education-

In addition to the training sessions, the

programme included tours to historical and contemporary sites in Dushanbe including the Tajik National Museum, the National Library, and the picturesque Varzob Valley.

The session was attended by a large number of civil society practitioners, members of the academia, media, and the UCA community including faculty, students, and staff.

Dr. Shamsh Kassim-Lakha, Chairman UCA Board of Trustees, introduced Dr. Zaidi calling her "an exemplary figure for countless young individuals." Dr. Zaidi's lecture delved into several personal anecdotes of her philanthropic involvement. Acknowledging the significance of philanthropy, Dr. Zaidi reminded the audience of the philanthropic initiative of His Highness the Aga Khan in establishing the University of Central Asia.

"Philanthropy plays a very big role where the government capacity is limited. Philanthropy should cooperate with civil society and government, and it can be instrumental in lifting these countries out

of poverty," – stated Dr. Zaidi underlining the importance of philanthropy in driving positive change and sustainable development.

At the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Dr. Zaidi oversees the efforts of the Foundation to achieve gender equality by integrating gender across the Foundation's global work and investing in women's economic empowerment and women's leadership

enabling women and girls to thrive. Dr. Zaidi earned a medical degree, specializing in pediatric infectious diseases, at AKU and completed her further studies at Duke University, Harvard Medical School, and the Harvard School of Public Health. She has published more than 200 research papers on vaccine-preventable diseases and newborn infections in resource-limited settings.

UCA Research Fellow's Film Wins Prestigious Environmental Journalism Award



Aibek Baiymbetov, a Research Fellow at University of Central Asia's Cultural Heritage and Humanities Unit Graduate School of Development, is one of nine talented filmmakers from Central and South Asia who directed the documentary series "Voices from the Roof of the World" (VRW) Season Two. This series was recently honoured by the Columbia Journalism School with the prestigious 2023 John B. Oakes Award for Distinguished Environmental Journalism.

The episode "Cold Wind Valley", directed by Aibek Baiymbetov, takes viewers on a journey through the Khan Tengri Nature

Park. The film shows the Sary-Jaz area, a unique place on the map of Kyrgyzstan, fringed by the highest peaks in the Tien Shan range, Peak Pobeda (7439 m) and Khan-Tengri (6995 m). The untouched nature of Khan Tengri Nature Park is already affected by a host of anthropogenic influences, including air pollution. The film is available for viewing on [YouTube](#).

The John B. Oakes Award for Distinguished Reporting on the Environment at Columbia Journalism School is given annually for news reporting that makes an exceptional contribution to the public's understanding

of environmental issues. It recognizes journalists whose work meets the highest standards of journalistic excellence.

The VRW documentary series has garnered widespread acclaim for its captivating storytelling, breathtaking visuals, and its ability to foster cross-cultural understanding. "We wanted to ensure that the voice of the voiceless is heard. Together with the talented filmmakers, we wanted to share their stories with a global audience," said VRW executive producer Andrew Tkach, who has over three decades of expertise in creating documentaries and reports and having been honoured with eight Emmys in the news and documentary category.

Voices from the Roof of the World is a joint initiative of the Aga Khan Development Network agencies: the University of Central Asia, Aga Khan University, Aga Khan Agency for Habitat, and Aga Khan Foundation. VRW trains, mentors, and supports young filmmakers to produce groundbreaking environmental films about the consequences of climate change for the people and wildlife that are the least responsible for global warming but already shouldering its catastrophic impacts.

SPCE Holds Graduation Ceremonies

UCA's School of Professional and Continuing Education (SPCE) provides short cycle professional education courses designed to improve employment and income-generating opportunities for young women and men. It recently held a series of Graduation Ceremonies at Tekeli, Kazakhstan as well as at Bokhtar, Khorog, and Dushanbe in Tajikistan.

SPCE Khorog celebrated the passing out of the largest cohort of 200 learners who received certificates across a range of courses including Business Planning, Social Entrepreneurship, English for Medical Purposes, IT and TVET.

Aslikhan Marodbekov, one of the graduates of the Conversational English Programme, gave a speech at the ceremony. "I want to express my deepest gratitude to our incredible instructors for their immense contributions. The ceremony in Tekeli ceremony saw the presence of several representatives of local government as well as graduates of previous years who displayed cultural performances. Nariman Estibaev, Head of Department of Education in Tekeli, expressed his gratitude for the work of SPCE. "It brings me immense

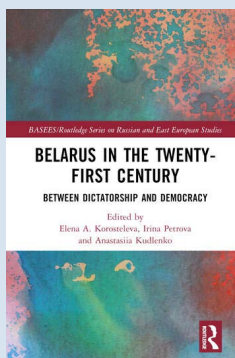
This partnership will specifically benefit students enrolled in UCA's School of Arts and Sciences (SAS), majoring in Computer Sciences and Global Economics. They will

UCA Fellow Earns Doctoral Degree on Mountainous Farming Systems Classification

To build local human capital, UCA collaborates with reputable partner universities to provide scholarships for Central Asian researchers to pursue their doctoral and post-doctoral studies in areas of relevance to Central Asia. This initiative is known as the Central Asian Faculty Development Programme (CAFDP).

Azamat Azarov, a fellow of UCA's CAFDP has successfully defended his doctoral thesis entitled "Development of methodology for mountainous farming systems classification: Case study of Tien Shan Mountains, Kyrgyzstan" at the Faculty of Tropical Agrisciences at the Czech University of Life Sciences, Prague. Azarov's research has resulted in the publication of two peer-reviewed papers and

an additional two under review. Azarov's supervisors include esteemed academics from Czech and German universities as well as UCA's Mountain Societies Research Institute.

The findings of Azarov's rigorous research will benefit policymakers and development practitioners in efforts to promote rural development of mountain regions that will alleviate current socio-economic disparities. As the region faces challenges related to agricultural productivity and adaptation to changing climatic conditions, Azarov's work stands to offer practical and context-specific solutions that could bolster food security and livelihoods across Central Asian mountain communities.

SPCE Student Secures First Place at HIPPO Olympiad in Turkey

Anisa Imomberdieva has secured first position in the prestigious HIPPO "English Without Borders" Olympiad held in Turkey. She has now qualified for the world finals in Rome, Italy. The HIPPO Olympiad is organised by the Global Hippo Association, an Italian non-profit dedicated to promoting English. Anisa Imomberdieva has previously won several international competitions, including in Mental Maths.

Anisa is a long-term student of the Khorog centre of UCA's School of Professional and Continuing Education (SPCE). Currently enrolled in the Academic Achievement Programme (AAP), she has completed several

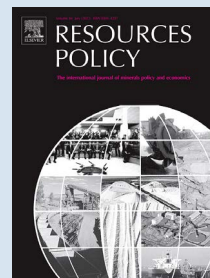
courses, including mental math, at SPCE.

Anisa's traces her fascination with the English language to her childhood conversations with her mother. "My early interest stemmed from my mother's practice of conversing with me in English.
